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MINERS BEGIN STRIKE AS SENATE COMMITTEE PROBES

Industrial War Breaks Out Again in West Virginia Coal Fields as Probe Begins Its Second Week

15,000 EXPECTED TO QUIT AND JOIN OTHERS

No Union Men in Paint and Cabin Creek Districts at Work and Many Non-Union Miners Leave Tools Also

(By Associated Press.) CHARLESTON, June 15.—With industrial war again declared in West Virginia the senate coal strike investigating committee today confronted a situation, intricate and complicated.

Word from the isolated sections of Paint Creek and Cabin Creek that the strike was again declared in the Charleston from a half dozen sources and representatives of mine operators and state officials sought in vain for definite word from the strike camps along the creeks.

The union attorneys appearing before the committee said they were only the men back in the field today at meetings held yesterday but they were unable to make any estimate of the number of strikers.

With the New River district, a few miles away from the creeks, awaiting only the signal to set off a contingent of excitement, the committee today watched the situation with four and a half million people, the largest outbreak on Paint and Cabin creeks since the strike.

The mine operators yesterday according to reports reached the Charleston and returned to the ground that the operators had not used their right to work without discrimination. They called the miners' strike a "black and white" strike.

Attorney Associated With Prosecution, Says State Is Ready for Frank Trial

With Attorney General Dorsey away on a short vacation, the state's case against Leo M. Frank, who is charged with the murder of Mary Phagan, is now in charge of Frank A. Hooper, the state's attorney, who is associated with the solicitor.

"The state's case is complete," Mr. Hooper said Monday morning, "and we are waiting quietly for the report on the 25th of the month to come."

"The defense will stop writing cards," continued Mr. Hooper, "and stop having their friends write them, the public can be given a needed rest from the case until the trial."

Mr. Hooper's statement that the prosecution is waiting for the trial on June 30 is the most authoritative announcement of the date of the trial yet made.

Solicitor General Dorsey has steadfastly refused from any definite announcement about the time of the trial, but it has been generally understood for some time that the solicitor set the case on the court for June 30, and it will then remain with the defense as to whether there is a postponement.

Mr. Hooper's name was not publicly connected with the case until the understanding was reached that the solicitor general had been consulting with the state's attorney, who is associated with the solicitor.

With the state's case regarded as complete and satisfactory, attorneys and judges are now devoting their energies to preparing for the trial, which is expected to be held in the state court.
