Citizens of Suburb Meet and Organize to Boost Advantages of Attractive Town

The meeting resulted in the definite organization of the board with a charter enrollment of fifty-two—the numerous others present were eligible preferring to defer their membership for a time. Street addresses were heard among them being one from Charles D. McKinney, of Decatur, one of the most energetic workers in the steady advancement of that town.

George F. Longino, Jr., was elected president. The following were present: Charles W. Parke, W. J. Dims, L. C. McCarty, Alonzo Richardson, Ray A. P. O'Keefe, J. A. Northcutt and E. E. Cooper. Rev. Fritz Haunshenberg, of the Presbyterian ministry, upon whose initiative the meeting was called, was elected secretary.

WOULD INSTALL ELECTRIC METERS ON THE OUTSIDE

City Electrician Turner Has Plan Which He Believes Company Will Approve. City Electrician R. C. Turner is planning an ordinance to require electric light meters to be installed on the outside of houses, or in some other equally accessible place, and expects to get the indorsement of the architect, the builders and the Georgia Railway and Power company.

"I believe this is one proposition advanced by me which the power company will not oppose," says he. "The installation of meters outside of houses, instead of inside, will prove a great convenience to the power company's meter readers."

"Meters at the present time are installed in every piece from the cellar to the garret. If a meter reader finds a meter which is frequent, he has to go back. Sometimes he finds them out of order. He has to go back and change the meter. This is a great inconvenience to the meter reader."
