### SECRET HUNT BY BURNS IN MYSTERY IS LIKELY

Probably Will Not Reveal Presence in City as He Investigates Phagan Case.

Colonel Thomas B. Filder said Wednesday that Detective William J. Burns had not arrived, as yet, in New York from his European trip, but that as soon as he did he undoubtedly would start at once for Atlanta to work upon the Mary Phagan, strangling mystery.

Colonel Filder is acquainted with the day and the hour on which the famous sleuth will reach this city, but for the purposes of the investigation he is withholding the information.

There was no authority for the statement that Detective Burns would be in New York Tuesday, said Colonel Filder. "The date of his arrival has been known to my office, but it has not been made public."

"It is quite likely that the great detective will come quietly and unannounced into the city, make his investigation of the mystery and slip out before many persons are aware from their own knowledge that he has been working on the case."

In Touch With Burns Agency.

Colonel Filder has been in constant touch with Raymond Burns, son of the detective, who is secretary and treasurer of the Burns Agency, and has offices in New York. The agency is being placed in possession of the important new developments in the mystery as rapidly as they occur. An outline of the whole case will be before Burns the first time he arrives at his New York office.

Interesting importance is being attached to the notes that were found beside the dead body of Mary Phagan, which were written by New Law, the night watchman at the National Pencil Factory. The expert was corroborated by the unofficial testimony of two other experts.

Dana Durand, now director of the Census, becomes effective, Democrats were ready today to declare a temporary truce.

This fight is the first real battle on a Wilson appointment.

Republicans assert that the Harris appointment is political and that Durand should be permitted to serve out his term.

The rules of the Senate permit one member to conduct a filibuster without limit. The determination of Senators Burton, Townsend, La Follette and Cummins to have off Harris' confirmation, is apparent.

### BATTLE OVER CHIEF'S ROLE MODERATOR NEARS HOT CLASH

Race Has Narrowed Down to Drs. Maitland Alexander, Pittsburg, and S. S. Palmer, Columbus.

A spectacular contest for the moderatorship of the Presbyterian Assembly, U. S. A., will reach its climax at 3 o'clock this afternoon when the forces behind Dr. Maitland Alexander, of Pittsburg, and Dr. S. S. Palmer, of Columbus, Ohio, meet in the first test of strength. Dr. William McElbain, president of Lane Theological Seminary, of Cincinnati, has been put forward, but pre-convention gossip has it that the final fight will be between Drs. Alexander and Palmer.

Members of the progressive wing of the denomination are strong in their contention that there is no radical candidate for the moderatorship. They charge that in violation of precedent and the expressed wish of the assembly, an organization has been effected in support of Dr. Alexander and that solicitation in his behalf has been made for months past.

It has been made to appear, they say, that Dr. Palmer is a radical and that he is lined up with Union Seminary. Dr. Palmer's friends claim that while he is a progressive, he is not a radical.

Foresee Doom of Radical.

No one can win the moderatorship according to commissioners who are already here and who are warmly discussing the oncoming battle of battle. No ultra-conservative can be elected, they also agree.

Intense interest centers in the fight for moderatorship. It is stated that the moderatorship is a body with considerable power in the assembly, particularly in the matter of discipline.

"The great question at issue in this Atlanta meeting," said a prominent commissioner Wednesday, "is whether or not the church will continue its present progressive policy or return to the methods in vogue 50 years ago."

The contest for moderatorship is, in some respects, a fight between the two great Presbyterian seminaries of the country, Princeton and Union. It is recognized that Princeton is the most conservative of conservative theological institutions, and that Union has adopted many of the modern tendencies and has on its staff numerous of the most advanced thinkers.

It is claimed that Dr. Alexander is closely allied with Princeton and that he was offered a place on his list against Dr. Palmer that he has heard some time ago. ### OUTLAW ANGLERS RICH SALDOONIST OPEN FIRE ON WARDENS SHOT; WIFE IS ACCUSED

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 14.—H. P. McNeill, a wealthy saloon man of this city, was shot at the Pablo Beach summer home today and is now in a local hospital with a bullet in his brain. The attending physician says he can not recover. His wife and chauffeur were arrested, charged with the crime.

The chauffeur told the police that the three went together in a room in the house, and that McNeill fired a shot on his wife. When he attempted to dislodge McNeill from shooting, the chauffeur said, he was knocked down and in the scuffle which followed McNeill was shot in the back of the head.

DALLAS, TEX., May 14.—Take Forrest Adair's word for it, Atlanta is going to win today.

Just before closing, the sign records and going into the hall of the Imperial council of the Mystic Shrine today Mr. Adair and his faithful Yarrab boosters and boomers held a final council of war.

After checking every name on the rolls of representatives and the Imperial council, and after tightening up all the rivets everywhere, the conference, decided that Atlanta should win over Memphis by approximately two to one, and that only the most unexpected and unanticipated complication could prevent Atlanta capturing the 1914 gathering.

It is not to be supposed that this campaign in Dallas has been all easy sailing. On the contrary, much of it has been exceedingly rough, although never dangerous so far as the Yarrab could see.

Memphis has made a game fight and has had stout-hearted friends on hand waging her battle. It has been shown, however, that Atlanta has very much the better of Memphis in the matter of total accommodations and the Dallas gathering has been flooded with invitations from officials of Georgia and the city of Atlanta, clubs and business organizations as well as many private persons.

The substantial work has been intelligently handled. That large entertainment fund, reaching well over \$100,000, coupled with the assurance that there is more money where that came from, all served this year's success seemingly certain.

Lietta Talk of "Dark Horse."

The Atlanta delegation has been dropping out of course. Some delegates having no particular joy in the prospect of Memphis, although few of that sort have been invited have undertaken to start talk of a "dark horse" in Dallas and Boston have been mentioned as acceptable meeting places for next year. Baltimore has also been mentioned.

In the main, however, the contest for the honor of entertaining the Imperial council has been confined to Atlanta and Memphis, with Atlanta always leading easily.

It is predicted that there will be a much larger crowd in Atlanta next year than in Memphis. In the first place, the Shriners have been convinced that Atlanta has the hotel accommodations and the funds to make things hum, neither of which Dallas has had to the extent of making this year's season all it might have been.

In the second place, the enthusiasm of the Atlanta delegation has been of a genuinely winning variety all the time. It is a foregone conclusion that the Imperial Council is to meet in San Francisco in 1915, the year of the Panama Exposition, and for that reason it is the purpose of the Shriners to have next year's session in the East.

Ballot Wednesday Afternoon.

The voting on next year's meeting, expected to take place between now and next week, was deferred until later in the afternoon.

It is expected that Atlanta will win easily in the early stages of the vote. If intelligent leadership, carefulness of purpose and thoroughness of method count for anything, Forrest Adair's fight should win today. He reached here among the first, but there is not a delegate or a representative whom he has not seen.
