

# MRS. FRANK REPLIES TO DOBSEY.

## "Torture Chamber Testimony to Take Away a Man's Life"

ALWAYS FIRST THE SUNDAY AMERICAN  
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### WILSON MAY PERSON REPLY TO LOBBYING CHARGE

Says He May Cast Aside Official Title to Defend Himself Against Attack.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—As a result of the attack of Senator Townsend of Michigan, on the "lobbying" of President Wilson, the Chief Executive to-day is considering casting aside his official title and testifying before the senatorial investigation committee as a private citizen, both as to what he knows of the lobbying interests and also to defend himself against the attacks of Republican Senators.

Senator Townsend's charges that the President himself is lobbying for the passage of the Underwood tariff bill have aroused great resentment at the White House. Secretary to the President Tamm to-day said while he did not consider the Townsend charges specific enough to warrant an official reply from the President of the United States, he thought it likely that the President will testify as a private citizen.

Before deciding on such a step, however, the President will consult with several of his Senatorial advisers, and it is considered probable the White House Secretary will appear before the lobby committee and deny without warning. It is admitted that his testimony would be sensational in the extreme because he had a number of careful investigations of the lobby situation before issuing his denunciation of the lobbyists, which started the Congressional investigation.

Officially Defend President. White House officials deny without reservation the charge that the President has used the "big stick" of the White House to force the adoption of his views on the lobby situation. The President has prepared to produce a list of the patronage already granted, which will show that Senators who have announced that they intend to vote against the bill have received exactly the same treatment in the matter of appointments as have those who intend to support the measure.

Committee Against Recalling Senators. WASHINGTON, June 8.—Democratic Senators on the Overman lobby investigating committee to-day expressed the opinion that the administration of Senator Townsend that he had no specific information on which to base his accusations of lobbying.

"I see no reason for recalling those Senators who have testified," said the investigating committee. "Senator Townsend's charge was based simply on the interest of the administration in the tariff bill. He has admitted that this interest was natural and that the act of the administration was merely following precedents established by the parties in power since the creation of the administration. Personally, I shall not recommend any Senator to recall to testify on this issue."

Senator Walsh, the other Democratic member present to-day, sent the following message to Governor Nelson and Nelson were inclined to recall and Cummins had announced that he will bring to the attention of the committee the facts regarding the shadowing of the "lobbying" interest. It is believed he will call the recall of several Senators to question them along this line.

### Snow After Record Hot Day in Chicago

CHICAGO, June 8.—Snow fell in Chicago for the first time in 114 years, the season's warmest temperature of 88 degrees was registered. The falling of snowflakes lasted ten minutes in Austin, a suburb of Chicago.

A 40-mile gale direct from the north east for the first time in 114 years in fifteen hours here. Many persons were hurt in the whirlwind, and property damage estimated at several thousand dollars was caused.

### Mad Dog Bite Kills Girl at Waycross

WAYCROSS, GA., June 8.—Surging intense agones, little Susie Lloyd died early to-day from hydrophobia. She was bitten by a mad dog in the streets of this city early in March, and was rushed to Atlanta for treatment. Only a partial treatment was taken there, the remainder being administered by a local physician.

She is the second victim of mad dogs in Waycross within a month. Much uneasiness is felt here, as many children have been bitten recently.

### Death of J. S. Coles, Insurance Man, Traced to Worry Caused by Millionaire's Fury

By COLE E. MORGAN. JACKSONVILLE, FLA., June 8.—While no new light has been shed on the mystery in the death of E. O. Painter, the millionaire banker, who is attributed directly to worry over the affair.

Mr. Coles, a brother of P. Coles, the Atlanta banker; Mrs. Stewart Phinizy, of Augusta; Mrs. J. D. Taylor, of Columbia, S. C.; a general agent of the Equitable Life Assurance Society, which owned policies on Painter's life totaling \$100,000, and which refused him \$50,000 additional on the ground that he was overinsured. These applications had gone through the Jacksonville office. The Equitable was one of those active in investigating Painter's death. This company ranked next to the Mutual in the amount of insurance on Painter.

His Death a Surprise. Coles had been in a health for several months. The Painter mystery caused him much worry, as it did the agents of other companies interested. A few days ago, while the Painter investigation was in progress, he was forced to take his bed, but his illness was not considered serious and it was stated at his office only Friday afternoon that he was expected at his desk within a few days. However, before the day was over he was stricken with a heart attack and died almost immediately.

The announcement of his death to-day came as a real shock in Jacksonville business circles, for Coles was one of the most popular men here. He had been a resident of Jacksonville for nine years. He was 57 years old, his wife and eight children survive him.

Rush Active Investigation. The United Equitable, a New York life company, has been most active in the investigation of Painter's death. Each of these companies had an adjuster here, directly representing the home office. Some of the companies have had inspectors on the ground, while two or three have been represented only by their resident general agents. The Mutual, being the largest company interested, had probably gone more thoroughly into the case than any other.

The local insurance men are reticent in discussing the details of the investigations made for their companies until the report on the autopsy and chemical examination of Painter's organs reaches the Coroner's office. They fear to disclose any of their information lest it prejudice the jury in the event of a trial.

State to Take No Action. The State of Florida, through the Criminal Court, is taking and will take no part in the Painter inquiry, declared William A. Hallows, State Attorney to-day. "There is no action to be taken," he said. "The death was due to any act of violence on the part of another, he said, and for that reason there is no occasion for an inquest as far as the Criminal Court is concerned. The law specifies that inquests are necessary only where there is suspicion of death being directly or indirectly a criminal act on the part of another. No such condition applies in this case, and I stated to the Coroner."

### PEOPLE SAY BEAVERS MIGHT BE IMPEACHED

Superior Court Judge Defends Order Which Was Attacked by Chief of Police.

"That Chief of Police James L. Beavers and Policeman James H. Kirke are subject to impeachment if the facts in the temporary restraining order of Mrs. N. P. Powell, who has been sentenced for four months in the case this morning.

The judge defended the State courts in interfering with his breaking up a disorderly house. He said the injunction distinctly read that the police were only permitted to make the woman move from the house and in no other way balked any action that might be contemplated.

He said the police were at liberty to raid an often as they saw fit and in a case against the woman every time she violated the law.

What Mrs. Powell Claims. "In the petition for an injunction the woman said Kirke made an improper proposal to her," said Judge Powell. "The alleged defendant then ordered him away he threatened to have her place raided every night and she was forced to leave."

"If she can prove that Beavers made the improper proposal and his threats and persistent attempts to be affluenced, the two are subject to impeachment."

Judge Hall stated the particular temporary restraining order, but I would have done the same thing had I seen on the bench that day. The law allows no latitude or discretion in this matter. A woman comes into court and makes a sworn statement that her home is not a disorderly house and that she anticipates irreparable wrong and injury if the police in forcing her to move. If the court were to wait until the matter could be tried, the injury would be done.

Injunction Case Up Soon. "A bill can not do otherwise than believe the sworn statement. The law demands that protection be given there is a wife's presence between a temporary and a permanent injunction, and it is more than probable that permanent injunction would not be granted."

"This particular injunction has been pending in the courts a little longer than the ordinary. It has been called three or four times, but on each occasion the attorneys for the city or the defense were not available and it had to be postponed. It was called in Friday, but the lawyers were in the other court for the case. It will be heard at an early date."

### SCORES READINESS TO TAKE 'EVIDENCE' FROM ANY SOURCE

Mrs. Leo Frank has made public the following letter which explains itself: Editor Atlanta Georgian:

I think fairness to Mr. Frank requires that the public should clearly understand Mr. Dorsey's position as stated by him in his card in The Constitution of June 8, and repeated in the papers yesterday, in reply to my statement that he proposes to use testimony which comes from witnesses as the result of torture.

His real position, as gleaned from his card, can be stated in the following sentence which he employed: "I have only to say, without in anywise taking issue with her premises as I might," that "I welcome all evidence from any source that will aid an impartial jury, without charge of the court, in determining the guilt or innocence of the accused."

That is to say, he thinks it unnecessary to waste time in disputing the fact that the detective is procuring testimony from witnesses by torture. He considers this point immaterial. He believes he is thoroughly justified in using tortured testimony, if it is turned over to him, for he says: "I welcome all evidence from any source."

### No Charge Against Woman

The Journal and The Constitution stated that he had had my cook arrested and carried to his office and quizzed so such an extent as to drive her into hysterics, and that after this he sent her screaming to the Police Station in the patrol wagon. After she had her office and was taken to the detective's Torture Chamber, and according to The Atlanta Constitution, she there had the third degree applied to her to the point of exhaustion, after which she made an affidavit, which the detectives, or someone, immediately gave out to the papers.

The Solicitor had no charge against this cook and did not suspect her of any crime. Yet Mr. Dorsey writes this as a trivial matter, not worthy to be discussed by him, because he says: "I welcome all evidence from any source," clearly implying that he will take it from the torture chamber if it is offered to him.

That he and the detective violated the criminal law in arresting my cook when they had no charge against her and when they suspected her of no crime, I am told by lawyers, admit of no doubt. But the Mr. Dorsey thinks need not be discussed by him.

### Thinks Public Is Opposed

While Mr. Dorsey thinks all this is entirely proper, it is the next thing to an impossibility to believe that many persons in the community will agree with him. Indeed, I would agree with him that he should restrain himself in the newspapers, torture chamber testimony to take away a man's life.

When Mr. Dorsey introduces this third-degree evidence to the Jury, can it be supposed that he will at the same time tell the jury that it comes direct from the torture chamber?

It is our time to suffer now. Can anyone tell where your turn will come next? I do not wish to be in any manner bitter toward Mr. Dorsey, even in my criticism, because it is so perfectly clear that his action is dictated by a serious misapprehension of judgment, and my only purpose is to let the community understand as thoroughly as I can, in the interest of fairness to the accused, that Mr. Dorsey is proposing to use third-degree torture chamber testimony in an effort to take his life, and that he thinks it is perfectly proper for him to do so.

Know She Can Not Testify. Mr. Dorsey and the detectives know that I can not go on the witness stand and deny the affidavits they have published in the newspapers, arising from my cook in the torture chamber by the third-degree process. Because I am informed that under the law a wife will not be permitted to testify either for or against her husband. The law puts this absolute seal upon my lips, and my only recourse is in letting the community know the facts through the newspapers as far as I can.

I know I can not keep up with all the false affidavits and false rumors and innuendoes that have been so industriously put in the newspapers, but I feel that I should call attention to the injustice to Mr. Dorsey's position, which he so boldly justifies. MRS. LEO M. FRANK.

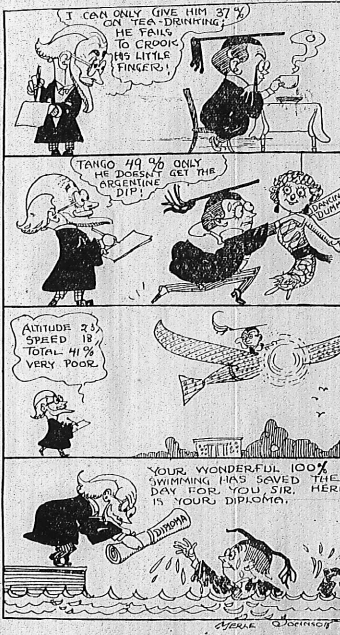

I believe it should be abolished. In no civilized country is the intention of the letter of the law to punish anyone until proven guilty. It is only a question of a short time until the barbarous third degree will be abolished by officers of the law.

It is we who say to our boys that such houses are necessary, then we say in our mouths that we do not allow them to say to our daughters? It reminds me of the old saying that a man will protect a woman against every man but himself.

Or can we segregate such places near our neighbor, be he ever so humble, when we would not have them near our own door, for you can not have such places in a city without putting them near some decent home or where they are exposed to the public gaze. Or can you have one stand and of morals for your boys and another for your girls? If you set a low standard for your boys, you set a low standard for your neighbor's girl. Why should we not do unto others as we would have them do unto us? And why do we as sworn officers of the law let the law slide? The man has not yet been born who would dare to propose an ordinance of a city or a statute of a State in which the white slavery and the betrayal of girls for sale.

Guilt Shared by All.

Some of us are wholly free from guilt who permit this open shame. There are State laws and city ordinances against such in every State in the Union, and if the laws are wrong, why not change them, and if they are right, why not enforce them? What respect have we for the man who lives on the rents of such places? Do you not have none, but sit on all day and let him carry on his nefarious business?

Do not say police officials can do away with this evil entirely, but I do say that it can be reduced to a minimum, and they can stay out of the public offices, and thereby put their hands on the neck of the law.

Or can you have one stand and of morals for your boys and another for your girls? If you set a low standard for your boys, you set a low standard for your neighbor's girl. Why should we not do unto others as we would have them do unto us? And why do we as sworn officers of the law let the law slide? The man has not yet been born who would dare to propose an ordinance of a city or a statute of a State in which the white slavery and the betrayal of girls for sale.

Guilt Shared by All.

Some of us are wholly free from guilt who permit this open shame. There are State laws and city ordinances against such in every State in the Union, and if the laws are wrong, why not change them, and if they are right, why not enforce them? What respect have we for the man who lives on the rents of such places? Do you not have none, but sit on all day and let him carry on his nefarious business?

Do not say police officials can do away with this evil entirely, but I do say that it can be reduced to a minimum, and they can stay out of the public offices, and thereby put their hands on the neck of the law.

Is it because they are in favor of continuing the old way of segregation as the best solution, or is it because they are influenced by politicians and the money interest that control them? I dare say that both have something to do with it in most instances.

How can any decent man say he is in favor of public indecency?

Before Children's Eyes.

Why should we maintain such houses before our children's eyes, for we do maintain them in a way that puts our approval on them? If we say to our boys that such houses are necessary, then we say to our neighbor's daughter that they are necessary, and would we say a thing to our neighbor's daughter that we would not allow him to say to our daughters? It reminds me of the old saying that a man will protect a woman against every man but himself.

Why should we segregate such places near our neighbor, be ever so humble, when we would not have them near our own door, for you can not have such places in a city without putting them near some decent home or where they are exposed to the public gaze. Or can you have one stand of morphine for your boys and another for your girls? If you set a low standard for your boys, you set a low standard for your girls' girls.

Why should we not do unto others as we would have them do unto us? And why do we as sworn officers of the law set the law aside? The man has not yet been born who would dare to protest an ordinance of a city or a statute of a State a law legalizing while slavery and the betrayal of girls for sale.

Quilt Shared by All.

None of us are wholly free from guilt who permit this open shame. These are State laws and city ordinances against such in every city in the Union, and if the laws are wrong, why not change them, and if they are right, why not enforce them. What respect have we for the man who lives on the rent of such places? You say you have none, but still you allow him to carry on his nefarious business.

Do not say police officials can do away with this evil entirely, but I do say that it can be reduced to a minimum, and they can stop recognizing it as public officers, and thereby put their stamp of disapproval on it. It might take a long time for doing.

It was Barnett who found the strands of hair on the lashing machine in his department. This is supposed to be where the girl was thrown against the machine in his struggle.

Later Barnett testified positively that the blood stains in the second floor were not there before the crime. He is certain that the girl was attacked on the second floor and just as certain that Conley, not Frank, was the slayer.

The letter reads:

**Editor The Georgian:**

I would like to make a statement in regard to the Mary Phagan murder.

See Monday's Notes.

If Jim Conley found Mary's body in the plating department near the ladies' toilet, why wasn't blood found on the floor there? He said that he carried the dead girl to where the blood was found, but it looks to me as though he must have let her fall with some force to cause all of the blood when there was none where he says she was found.

If Jim Conley wrote that note reading "That long tall black negro did this by himself," it looks like to me as though it were a trap to catch "Snowball," the elevator boy, but "Snowball" has been identified and strangled with Conley's or Newt Lee's, and I guess Jim had to switch one another track and lay the blame on Frank.

It looks shaky to me. I don't think that Mr. Frank would stand at the head of the stairs and let Jim hold, "Come on, get up, get up, get up, get up." Nor do I think that Mr. Frank would carry the dead girl to the elevator when there were people working on the top floor who might come down at any minute and see him carrying the body. It seems to me that if Mr. Frank committed the murder of Mary Phagan, he would have let her body in the metal department.

No, Jim carried her to the base ment where the metal department found the body, and I will tell you how I got it.

**Why Did He Go to Basement?**

It went from the second floor down one flight to the basement, crawled through the scuttle hole, about 3 1/2 feet square, and went down the ladder into the basement. There he was walked about 110 feet to the dingy toilet, and he saw the body about 10 feet from the door. There is a toilet on every floor. There is no clock in the basement to punch and Lee had no fire to make in the bell. It being Sunday morning, why did he particularly time his watch to this part of the basement?

Why did Jim Conley come down to the metal department the day that he was arrested? He came down to wash his shirt. Why did he do that on some other floor? He knows that he can't be arrested in the metal department, but why did he go to wash his shirt and shoe? He probably knew that they see no
