Rare Suit Is Being Waged in Secret by Relatives of King George.

The litigants are the Princess Royal, widow of the Duke of Fife and sister of King George, and her daughter, the present Duchess of Devonshire.

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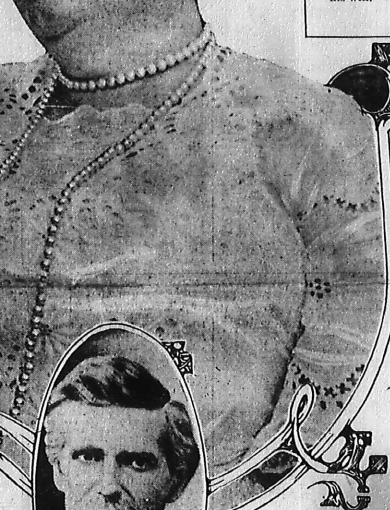

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PRESIDENT IS CRITICED WITH GOMPERS IN LABOR LOBBY

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Mr. Gompers' testimony will be heard with great interest in view of new and amazing revelations made by Colonel Mulhall, for ten years public and field agent for the manufacturers, in his relations with the American heretofore presents for what over they may be worth.

Here is Mulhall's letter to Field: "Atlantic City, N. J., July 12.—Mr. Philip Bird, General Manager National Association of Manufacturers, No. 30 Church Street, New York.

Dear Sir: I received your letter some time ago, but did not answer on account of being pressed with work for the past eight or ten days. I know you will be pleased to hear that Mr. John J. Since you wrote me I have also visited Mr. George W. Patchen in the district, and at his request will continue to do some work for him until the close of the campaign. This is the third victory that he has participated in since last April.

Mr. James McCallum was re-nominated in the Fourth Illinois District and he claims, largely by my help.

The principal reason for my writing this letter to you is to call your attention to the fact that I feel that every manufacturer in this country should unite and help to defeat William Hughes, late of the Sixth New Jersey District. I know it is not necessary for me to say a word to you concerning Hughes' record, for I feel that every manufacturer throughout the country who is interested in honest legislation and against class legislation knows what his record is.

I have got positive information that when Mr. Samuel Gompers and Mr. Frank Morrison and other members of the executive board of the American Federation of Labor and Congressionary Union were elected on Governor Wilson at his home in Sagart, around the first day of last July that they exacted a promise from Governor Wilson to support Hughes for the United States Senate, in this State, and that Governor Wilson has carried out his agreement to the letter, and that it is why Hughes is the nominee of the Democratic party at the present time.

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Today's statement of the labor unions, which was authorized at the recent convention of the labor union, is that the Governor has political insincerity in his declarations, in that he attempted, it is held, to array the labor voters against the workingmen of the city, charged him with prejudice favorable to the railroad, and with partial responsibility for the death of several persons who were shot by troops in Augusta during the strike there.

Question Legality of Act. The statement was prepared by an empowered committee, consisting of Jerome Jones, editor of The Journal of Labor, W. C. Patten, president of the State Federation, and Louis P. Marquardt, labor organizer in Atlanta.

The speech delivered by the then Governor, Joseph M. Brown, on October 23, 1912, at a banquet given by his military staff, entitled, "The Supremacy of the Law," was full of venom and misstatements of facts concerning the recent Georgia Railroad strike at Augusta, and particularly directed against organized labor.

In his message to the General Assembly last week the Governor rebuked his distributive organized labor. That he, in such a speech, attempted to array the country voter against the town and city voter is demonstrably true.

Charge Political Purpose. The Governor took as his text the then recent strike upon the Georgia Railroad. The strike had been virtually settled by arbitration, and it seems the Governor wanted to notify, all and singular, the union railway employes of Georgia that if Joseph Mackey Brown, would support any more strikes upon the railroad of the State, and, as we have calmly stated above, he seems to have used this subject as a pretext to array for selfish political ends the town for selfish political ends.

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JOE BROWN'S MESSAGE IS DENOUNCED BY LABOR LEADERS

Labor Leaders Declare Former Governor Is Endeavoring to Further Country Against City to Further His Political Ambitions. Address on Supremacy of Law in Connection With Augusta Strike Is Called a Studied Effort to Discredit Workingmen's Cause.

The Georgia Federation of Labor is out in a statement "to the Public" in which it bitterly condemns former Governor Joseph M. Brown for his address delivered last week at a special message to the General Assembly. Both utterances of the Governor had blamed striking employees of the Augusta Railroad Company and of the Augusta street car system for acts of disorder and the first utterance, the Augusta speech of October 1912, voiced the Governor's intention to deal summarily, through an exercise of military power, with offending strikers of the future.

Today's statement of the labor unions, which was authorized at a recent convention of union men, charges Governor Brown with political inactivity in his declarations, in that he attempted to shift the blame on the country voters against the workmen of the city; charges him with prejudicial favorability to the railroad and with partial responsibility for the death of several persons who were shot by troops in Augusta during the strike there. The charge of the labor men is that the action of the troops was without legal basis.

Question Legality of Act. The statement was prepared by an empowered committee, consisting of Jerome Jones, editor of The Journal; W. C. Packard, third vice president of the State Federation, and Louis P. Mangard, labor organizer for Atlanta. The three called to the aid of C. T. Ladson, attorney for the State Federation, for the discussion of the legality of the act of August 1912. The statement, in part, follows:

Attorney Leavitt defended the character of the man who made the affidavit and denied emphatically that Mincey even asked about the money he would receive as a witness, except whether his railroad fare would be paid if he were out of the city.

Explains Duke's Doubts. "I am not employed to the American Insurance Company and know its manager, J. S. Duker, very well," said Leavitt. I spent eleven days investigating the character of the man, questioning the women in the neighborhood and generally verifying the facts. When I turned it over to Mr. Roser, he was convinced of its absolute truth and that it would stand the test."

Habes Corpus Fight Failed. Habeas corpus proceedings in court of Judge Ellis Saturday morning, by agreement, Bernard L. Chaplin, representing Lee, withdrew his application for a habeas corpus. Solicitor Dorney promised to present a bill against Lee as a suspect in the Phagan murder case, with the expectation that a "no bill" would be returned. This appeared satisfactory to the attorneys for Lee as well as to the State.

Luther Z. Rosser, Reuben R. Arnold and Herbert J. Haas, of counsel for Frank, were in court to fight against the appearance of Frank as a witness. William M. Smith represented Conley, one of the witnesses subpoenaed.

Conley Gets Third Degree. Jim Conley underwent a racking third degree late Friday afternoon at the hands of Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorney and Attorney Frank A. Hooper in an effort to verify or discredit the W. H. Mincey affidavit, in which the negro was charged with confessing to the murder of a girl on the afternoon that Mary Phagan met her.
