WASHINGTON, July 17.—The German demand on the United States for protection of foreigners in Mexico has been suggested by similar demands from Great Britain, France and Italy, which learned at the White House late today.

The four nations have coupled this request with a detailed statement of conditions south of the Rio Grande as reported by their representatives.

The Government has reason to believe that dispatches from Ambassador Wilson have been tampered with and the President has decided to wait until he hears personally from the Ambassador before making any further move.

WOODWARD SAYS BROYLES AND HEED

Accused Woman Is On Stand Friday—Barber Is Only an Acquaintance, She Asserts.

A clash between the attorneys in the Crawford will case occurred Thursday morning when Burton Smith, Luther Z. Rosser, Colonel P. H. Brewster and Reuben Arnold faced at-law, to retract his charge that they were "perpetrating a nefarious scheme to rob the rightful heirs of Joshua B. Crawford."

The clash came while Colonel Brewster was on the witness stand telling of the litigation in the fight for the \$250,000 estate.

Reference was made to a previous statement by Attorney James that the attorneys on the other side of the case were attempting to perpetrate a "nefarious scheme to defraud."

"It stands on the minutes of the hearing," replied James hotly.

Attorney James raised no objection. Auditor Anderson ordered that the statement be stricken from the minutes and the case proceeded quietly.

Attorney James obtained permission to introduce another "golden witness" during the hearing Thursday.

Expectation that Mrs. Crawford would go on the stand at Thursday's hearing in her own behalf was shattered by the lengthy cross-examination of Colonel Brewster. The widow probably will go on the stand Friday.

Mrs. Crawford said Thursday morning that she would be able to prove her innocence of the sensational Crawford will case.

DORSEY BLOODES CONLEY IN CRIMINAL

GRAND JURY AGREES NOT TO ACT

Solicitor Bitterly Opposes Plan of New Body to Reconsider Slaying Case.

That the most strenuous opposition of Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey was all that prevented the last Grand Jury from reopening its investigation of the Phagan mystery with a view of indicting the negro Jim Conley became known Thursday.

It was admitted by persons acquainted with the events in the Grand Jury room that the Solicitor determined stand only blocked a consideration of the negro's connection with the crime. Well-substantiated reports also has it that Solicitor Dorsey before he would venture upon his vacation took the precaution of insuring on some sort of a guarantee from the jurors that they would take no action in his absence.

According to the Grand Jury of that time passed resolutions pledging itself to waive all consideration of the Phagan mystery until the Solicitor's return.

Hot Fight Certain.

The suggestion, however, has been revived, as was forecast in The Georgian when the new Grand Jury was called. The Solicitor has declared that he will not retreat one step and preliminary skirmishes to a hot fight already are taking place. The fight has resulted in a decision to determine whether Conley shall go on the stand in the trial of Leo Frank as a reputable, trustworthy and free citizen, the accused, or the Solicitor wishes to maintain him, or as a prisoner with the shadow of an indictment hanging over him.

In the latter aspect, several of the members of the Grand Jury are said to contend that he should appear in as much as he is a confessed accessory and a possible principal.

Defense for Frank.

The defense is said not to be opposed to the review of the case by the Grand Jury at this time nor to the indictment of Conley. Luther Z. Rosser, chief counsel for Frank, has charged from the first that Conley was the man guilty of the slaying of Mary Phagan, and it is presumed that he would be willing to enjoy the tactical advantage of that indictment of Conley probably would give the defense.

W. D. Hebble, foreman of the Grand Jury, intimated Thursday morning that the matter of calling the body together to consider a Conley indictment was under consideration by some of the members, but he said that no formal request had as yet been made for him to convene them. He said that he would issue the call when he had received a sufficient number of requests.

It is understood that the request will be submitted to the foreman Thursday, on the ground that the evidence connecting Jim Conley directly with the crime is infinitely stronger than the evidence on which Leo Frank was indicted about two months ago and that for this reason Conley should not be permitted to go before a jury as a free and unsuspected man and testify against Frank.

LATEST NEWS

WASHINGTON, July 17.—The German demand on the United States for protection of foreigners in Mexico has been supplemented by similar demands from Great Britain, France and Italy, it was learned at the White House late today.

The four nations have coupled this request with a detailed statement of conditions south of the Rio Grande as reported by their representatives.

The Government has reason to believe that dispatches from Ambassador Wilson have been tampered with and the president has decided to wait until he hears personally from the ambassador before making any further move.

WOODWARD SAYS WOODWARD LUMP WILL BE AID HER

A clash between the attorneys in the Crawford case occurred Thursday morning when Burton Smith, Luther Z. Rosser, Colonel P. H. Brewster and Reuben Arnold forced J. S. James, attorney for their client, to retract his charge that they were "perpetrating a nefarious scheme to rob the rightful heirs of Joshua B. Crawford."

The clash came while Colonel Brewster was on the witness stand telling of the litigation in the fight for the \$265,000 estate.

Reference was made to a previous statement by Attorney James that the attorneys on the other side of the case were attempting to perpetrate a nefarious scheme to defraud the estate.

"I demand that apology be made to this court for that statement," said Colonel Brewster, looking menacingly toward Attorney James.

"I threaten J. Promissuosity," Attorney James replied.

Auditor James L. Anderson tried to restore order and Luther Rosser was called to the stand.

His first statement was a threat to the attorneys on the opposite side, looking toward Attorney James, he said:

"I am going to tell everything I know about this case. If any further attempt is made to perpetrate a nefarious scheme (he leaned across the table to Attorney James) I will consider it a personal matter."

Burton Smith, who figured prominently in the case about a month ago, in a hearing of the hearing-law, and Reuben Arnold, who was Smith's second in the famous fight, took a hand and demanded that full apology be made for the charges and that it be stricken from the minutes.

Stricken From Record.

Attorney Anderson ordered that the statement be stricken from the minutes and the case proceeded quietly.

Attorney James obtained permission to introduce another "poison witness" during the hearing Thursday. He would not reveal the identity of his new witness, except to say that it was a physician who had made an examination of the contents of Crawford's stomach.

Expectation that Mrs. Crawford would go on the stand at Thursday's hearing in her own behalf was blighted by the lengthy cross-examination of Colonel Brewster. The widow probably will go on the stand Friday.

Mrs. Crawford said Thursday morning that she would be able to prove her innocence of the sensational charges, and would produce Fred Lump at the proper time to go before a jury as a witness in her behalf.

"I expected to have Mr. Lump here as a witness and would have done so had the other side acted properly in the matter," said Mrs. Crawford. "I don't think I would have any trouble locating him if they really were interested in him, for I think he would be anxious to prove the falsity of the charges that connect him with an affair about which he knows absolutely nothing."

Talk of Meeting Lump.

WOODWARD SCORED BY BROYLES

"Can't Convince Ignorant Man He's Mistaken," Says Judge, Quoting Epictetus.

WHAT BROYLES THINKS OF THE MAYOR.

He's ignorant as civilization. He knows as much law as a boy does political economy.

WHAT WOODWARD THINKS OF RECORDEUR.

He's a petty calf. My office is bigger than his. If he wants to run my office, let him come up and give me orders.

"Do not argue with an ignorant man, for you can never convince him he is wrong."

Recorder Nash R. Broyles, quoting Mr. Epictetus, the late well-known Greek philosopher, spoke thusly Thursday.

Following this declaration Mr. Broyles then declined to argue with Mayor James G. Woodward over the action in the case of Cliff Freeman, an alleged notorious blind tic operator, whom Broyles had sentenced to a \$500 fine and a 30-day term in the workhouse, when the Mayor declared he did not propose to do the city prison turned into a modern B-berth by a "too severe and car-like Recorder."

Impugns His Legal Lore.

Mayor Woodward knows as much about law as a hog does about political economy," was the Recorder's snarl.

However, to "set himself right," Judge Broyles issued the following statement:

"Yesterday a man named Freeman, the most notorious blind tic operator in captivity, was convicted of selling whisky. The evidence was overwhelming. Five white men testified as to Freeman's guilt and one said he had been buying whisky from Freeman for the last seven years.

"This is the same Freeman whom Mayor Woodward freed from the workhouse in 1910. He did this, too, after asking me about the case over the telephone and assuring me that he would not interfere with my decision.

"In regard to the Court of Appeals reversing his criticism of Recorder Woodward, I have this to say: Since I have been Recorder the Court of Appeals has sustained me in ten cases where they have reversed me in one.

"The most ludicrous act of Mayor Woodward was in connection with the case of Cliff Freeman, who was sentenced to a year in the penitentiary and who was later released by the Fulton County Superior Court and the Court of Appeals. But Mayor Woodward calmly announced, with a straight face, that he had decided the evidence was insufficient to convict."

"An enemy to Society."

"If he reversed the decision of the Recorder, the Superior Court and the Court of Appeals--and this by a man who knows about as much about law as a hog knows about political economy--I must say that a man who blocks the courts in an effort to stop law violation of this and other similar kind is an enemy to civilization and to society."

Mayor Woodward Thursday amplified his criticism of Recorder Broyles. He declared he was restraining his feelings in his effort to keep a cool head, but there were just a few things he had to say about the Recorder.

"Does Broyles stand the bigger corner," began the Mayor. "He has overthrown him many more times."

WOMAN SAYS LUMP WILL AID HER

Accused Woman to Go on Stand Friday--Barber is Only An Acquaintance, She Asserts.

A clash between the attorney in the Crawford will case occurred Thursday morning when Burton Smith, Luther S. Houser, Colonel P. H. Brewster and Reuben Arnold forced S. E. James, attorney for her husband, to retract his charge that they were "perpetrating a nefarious scheme to rob the rightful heirs of Joshua B. Crawford.

The clash came while Colonel Brewster was on the witness stand telling of the litigation in the fight for the \$500,000 estate.

Reference was made to a previous statement by Attorney James that the attorneys on the other side of the case were attempting to prepare a "nefarious scheme to defraud" the estate. James said he had been told by this court that that statement, said Colonel Brewster, looking menacingly toward Attorney James.

Auditor James L. Anderson tried to retract the statement as a threat to the attorneys on the opposite side.

Looking toward Attorney James, he said:

"I am going to tell everything I know about this case. If any further reference is made to a 'nefarious scheme' (he leaned across the table to Attorney James) I will consider it a personal matter."

Attorney James, who negated himself in the case about a month ago by beating two of the heirs-at-law, and Reuben Arnold, who was Smith's second in the famous fight, took a hand and demanded that full apology be made for the charge and that it be stricken from the minutes of the court.

Stricken From Record.

Attorney James raised no objection. Auditor Anderson ordered that the statement be stricken from the minutes and the case proceeded quietly.

Attorney James obtained permission to introduce another "poison witness" during the hearing Thursday.

He would not reveal the identity of his new witness, except to say that it was a physician who had made an examination of the contents of Crawford's stomach.

Expectation that Mrs. Crawford would go on the stand at Thursday's hearing in her own behalf was blasted by the lengthy cross-examination of Colonel Brewster. The widow probably will go on the stand Friday.

Mrs. Crawford said Thursday morning that she would be able to prove her innocence of the sensational charges and would produce Fred Lump at the proper time to go on the stand as a witness in her behalf.

"I expected to have Mr. Lump here and the other side acted properly in the matter," said Mrs. Crawford. "I don't think they would have any trouble locating him if they really wanted to find him, for I think he would be anxious to prove the falsity of the charges that connect him with an affair about which he knows absolutely nothing."

Tells of Meeting Lump.

GRAND JURY AGREED NOT TO ACT

Solicitor Bitterly Opposes Plan of New Body to Reconsider Slaying Case.

"That the most strenuous opposition of Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey was all that prevented the last Grand Jury from reopening its investigation of the Phagan mystery with a view of indicting the negro Jim Conley because known Thursday. It was admitted by persons acquainted with the events in the Grand Jury room that the Solicitor determined not only blocked a consideration of the negro's connection with the crime. Well-substantiated reports also had it that Solicitor Dorsey before he would venture on his vacation took the precaution of insulating on some sort of a guarantee from the jurors that they would take no action in his absence.

According to his request, the Grand Jury of that time passed resolutions requesting that the Grand Jury be reconstituted to take into consideration of the Phagan mystery until the Solicitor's return.

Hot Fight Certain.

The action, however, has been justified, as was forecast in The Georgian when the new Grand Jury was organized. It is certain that he will not retreat one step and preliminarily skirmishes to a hot fight already are taking place. The fight has resolved itself into a contest to determine whether Conley shall go on the stand in the trial of Frank and as a result, trustworthiness and free citizen, the status in which the Solicitor wishes to maintain him, or as a grander with the shadow of an indictment hanging over him.

In the latter aspect, several of the members of the Grand Jury are said to contend that he should appear, inasmuch as he is a confessed accessory and a possible participant in the defense for action.

The defense is said not to be opposed to the review of the case by the Grand Jury of this time, nor to the indictment of Conley. Luther S. Rosser, chief counsel for Frank, has charged from the first that Conley was the man guilty of the slaying of Mary Phagan, and it is presumed that he would be willing to enjoy the "advantage" that the indictment of Conley probably would give the defense.

W. D. Beattie, chairman of the Grand Jury, intimated Thursday morning that the matter of calling the body together to consider the case by some of the members, but he said that no formal request has as yet been made for him to convene them. He said that he would issue the call when he had received a sufficient number of requests.

It is understood that the request will be submitted to the former Grand Jury on the ground that the evidence connecting Jim Conley with the crime is infinitely stronger than the evidence on which Leo Frank was indicted about two months ago, and that for this reason Conley should not be permitted to go before a jury as a free and unsuspected man and testify against Frank.
