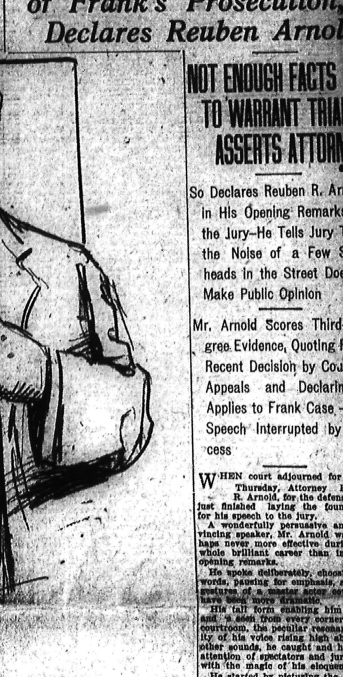

Battle to Death With Knives After Wednesday Night Prayer Meeting at New Hope Church

One Dead, Three Badly Slain in Clash in Monthly at Church Door

Four men armed with pocket knives battled in the moonlight outside New Hope church, three miles from Marietta, after prayer meeting there Wednesday night, with the result that one is dead, another fatally wounded, and a third laid in the Cobb county jail on a charge of attempt to murder.

SENATE RESOLUTION WOULD PLACE TROOPS IN MEXICO AT ONCE

Parsons Introduces Measure to Require Wilson to Send Armed Force and Protect American Lives and Property

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Senator Parsons introduced today a resolution requiring President Wilson to take the necessary steps to place United States troops in Mexico to protect American lives and property; such step is to be taken by the president in no way an infringement of the president's authority.
