A eloquent old Solicitor Dorsey became in his argument Saturday afternoon that Mrs. J. W. Coleman, mother of Mary Phagan, the little girl whose murder Leo M. Frank is on trial, became hysterical and uttered several piercing cries, interrupting the solicitor's argument for several minutes.

The plainly apparent anguish of Mrs. Coleman had its effect upon Frank's mother and wife, and they covered their faces with their hands, while friends sought to calm the distressed and bereaved mother.

Mrs. Coleman was overcome with emotion when Solicitor Dorsey, pointing his finger at the defendant, declared that Mary Phagan had been murdered by her father, and that her father had been convicted of the crime. Mrs. Coleman then turned to her husband and said: "I am not a murderer, but I am a mother, and I am a woman who has been wronged."

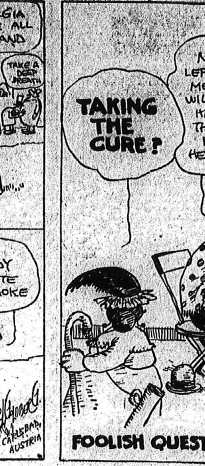

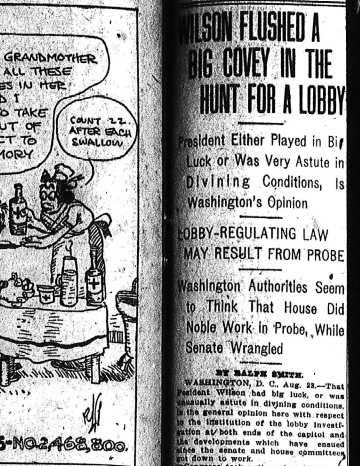
